



SBHC Planning Site Updates



2014 Needs Assessment

- Goals:
 - 1. Assess county-level interest in applying for planning grants in future years, should they become available
 - 2. Obtain feedback from LPHAs on the current SBHC funding mechanism and assess support for potential changes
- Interviews with 26 LPHA representatives, May-July:
 - 18 who currently have SBHCs within their counties
 - 8 who currently *do not* have SBHCs within their counties





2014 Needs Assessment

- Planning grant interest:
 - 20 "very interested" or "somewhat interested"
 - Projecting a total of 22-25 new sites
 - 6 "not very interested" or "not at all interested"
- Identified local barriers to planning new SBHCs
- Potential changes to SBHC funding mechanism:
 - 4 "very supportive," 8 "somewhat supportive"
 - 4 "not very supportive," 10 "not at all supportive"





SBHC Innovation Grants

- Support the following goals:
 - 1. Increase #of SBHCs certified as PCPCH
 - 2. Improve the coordination of the care of patients served by CCOs and SBHCs
 - 3. Improve the effectiveness of the delivery of health services through SBHCs who qualify for medical assistance
 - Funding available for larger, systems change projects and/or smaller, pilot projects
 - Grant term: July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015

- KPM changes will be finalized in Spring 2015 and implementation will begin in 2015-2016 school year







Mental Health Expansion Grant: Update

- 26 FTE hired
- 5,246 clients with mental health visits*
- 17,953 mental health visits*

* During the 2013-2014 school year

- Mental Health Screening or Framework
- Data Integration

- Cultural Competency and Equity





<u>Mental Health Screening or Framework</u> (Baker, Deschutes, Jackson, and Washington Counties)

- Adolescent SBIRT project
- Training by LifeWorks NW; Merlo Station is also participating (outside the grant in the NSBHA SBIRT project)





Data Integration

(Baker, Clackamas, Deschutes, Lane, Multnomah, Union, and Washington Counties)

- Most sites are implementing an EHR (OCHIN-Epic, NextGen, Greenway)
- Some are looking at exploring data integration with their primary care and mental health data systems





Telehealth (Curry and Wheeler)

- Equipment purchasing
- Provider time (psychiatric consultations)





<u>YAC</u>

(Deschutes, Jackson, and Washington Counties)

- Dedicated staff time to facilitate project
- Total of 8 schools will have YACs
- Each YAC will conduct a project on mental health





<u>Cultural Competency and Equity</u> (Jackson, Lane-4J, and Washington)

- Year-long trainings on cultural competency or with lens of equity
- Certified Medical Translator program





Mental Health Expansion Grant Update: Successes

- Stronger relationships with school and community
- Meeting needs of students



Satisfaction Survey Report: All Question Counts Total surveys: 30 Site:

All participating SBHCs with at least 10 completed surveys receive their site level report. Each year the SBHC State Program Office asks a random sample of students to share their opinions of the health care they receive at their SBHCs. The majority of Oregon's SBHCs participate in the survey by using either an iPad or paper/pencil. During the 2013-14 school year, 1396 students between the ages of 12 and 19 completed the Patient Satisfaction Survey. The survey is completed by the students in an anonymous and confidential manner.

•More importantly it indicates where students would like to have more information or if they have unaddressed needs on a particular health topic.






Prevention Messaging & Perceived Need

- Relevance to clinical practice/awareness?








% Youth Reporting SBHC Staff Discussed Prevention Topics



Did Staff Address Your Need?







Who Most Needs Extra Messaging?


- 25% of youth identified an unmet MH or PH Need

Takeaway Messages - Gender

Girls are <u>more likely</u> to...

- Report discussions of feelings, sexual health, healthy body weight
- Say their needs were met on the topics of sexual health, healthy body weight & grades

Boys are <u>more likely</u> to...

- Say they have NO NEED to talk about healthy eating, sexual health, healthy body weight
- Report NEEDING to talk about brushing & flossing





Other Takeaway Messages

Youth in urban SBHCs are more likely to...

- Report discussions of feelings, grades, healthy relationships and oral health
- Say their need was met on the topics of exercise, oral health, feelings, healthy relationships, sexual health and alcohol
- SBHC as "usual source of care" is strongly linked to youth getting messages, regardless of # of visits to SBHC

Small population driving Large Needs





2014-15 Patient Satisfaction Survey

- New survey coming by end of October
 - iPad sites will get email from Loretta
 - Paper sites will get mailing with tracking #
- Content very similar to 2013-14
- Target population same as prior years
 - Ages 12-19
 - Should be offered at the END of an SBHC visit
 - Only participate once per year





Changes to Satisfaction Survey

- No Coin Toss! Every eligible youth can participate
- Survey requirements more equitable
- Minimum # of surveys = ~12% of eligible youth seen in SBHC last year (see handout)
- Midyear check-in: Submit by January 15th, 2015
- Remaining surveys still due June 30th
- Paper-based sites will have tracking numbers for both mailings
