

Safe drinking water

Access to safe drinking water is essential to human health. Every human being requires at least 20 – 50 liters per day of clean, safe water for drinking, cooking and personal hygiene. Oregon Drinking Water Services works to help keep drinking water safe for Oregonians by administering and enforcing drinking water quality standards for public water systems in the state of Oregon.

Government Performance and Results Act data contains reported health-based (HB) violations of drinking water standards from 1994 to present. HB violations include contaminant levels above allowable maximums in the water served and failures to completely treat the water supply as required. Figure 1 below shows the percent of Oregon population served by community water systems (CWS) that meet all of the HB standards set forth in the Safe Drinking Water Act throughout each year.




* City of Portland coliform bacteria events in 2010, 2013 and 2014

Figure 1 shows that larger water systems that serve the majority of the state population generally meet safe drinking water standards, and this compares favorably to water systems across the U.S. Drops in 2010, 2013 and 2014 were attributed, in part, to coliform bacteria occurrences in Oregon’s largest community water system serving the City of Portland and surrounding areas.

Figure 2 shows the percent of Oregon community water systems (CWS) that meet all of the HB standards set forth in the Safe Drinking Water Act throughout each year.



This figure, viewed in combination with Figure 1, shows that the community water systems in Oregon that fail to meet safe drinking water standards generally serve small populations. Over time, efforts to improve safety of smaller community water systems in Oregon have brought their performance closer to that of systems across the U.S.
