House Bill 2009 passes, establishing the Oregon Health Policy Board and the Oregon Health Authority

**July 2011**

House Bill 3650 passes, directing OHA and OHPB to create a plan for coordinating health care in Oregon to ensure better care and lower costs.

**February 2012**

Senate Bill 1580 passes, approving the Board's CCO Proposal.

**December 2010**

Oregon Health Policy Board releases its *Action Plan for Health*, laying out Oregon's comprehensive health reform plan.

**January 2012**


After months of broad stakeholder input and workgroup meetings, the Oregon Health Policy Board releases its *CCO Implementation Proposal*.
