Misconception Presentation Facilitator Guide

Time: 25 - 30 minutes

Purpose:

- Challenge audience's perceptions and misconceptions about contraception
- Provide accurate information about contraception

Materials needed:

Powerpoint presentation titled: "Misconception Presentation"
Computer and projector
Screen

Preparation:

- Create a sign with the word MISCONCEPTION on it and a sign with CONTRACEPTION on it for the game.

Presentation:

What you see	What you say
Slide 1: Introduction	[Facilitator to introduce themselves to their audience]
	Today we are going to talk about CONTRACEPTION! What is contraception? [ask audience] Answer: Contraception includes methods that prevent pregnancy.

What you see	What you say
Slide 2: Misconceptions	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There are a lot of misconceptions about contraception out there. • Maybe you've heard stories from your parents, or you've heard about methods your friends have used (Coke as a douche, anyone?). • Today we are going to tackle some of these statements and see which ones are a MISCONCEPTION or are actually CONTRACEPTION!

Directions for Playing the Game

The following are two options for playing the game. See which one works for you.

1. Option 1:

Divide the room in half. Post a sign with the word MISCONCEPTION on one side of the room and another with CONTRACEPTION on it for the other side.

Click on a statement slide, or read it out loud, (slides with images: 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13, 15, 17) and ask the participants to move to either side of the room denoting their opinion about the statement. Then ask for a volunteer from each side to comment on why they answered that way. Ask if anyone has been convinced to change sides.

Afterwards, go to the corresponding slide that contains the truth statement (text slides: 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, 14, 16, 18).

Continue with the next slides for the 8 statements.

2. Option 2:

Have the large group split up into several groups. Show the statement slide and have each group discuss their answer. Then, have a representative from each group give their group's answer.

Show the truth statement slide and move on through the game.

Have the group tally up their scores. And at the end see which group had the most correct answers.
